

Become an Alderman

Openings for each of the four aldermanic districts are available every year in April. You must live in the district you wish to run. 2017 Spring Election

The Spring Election, scheduled for Tuesday, April 4, 2017 includes the aldermanic positions from each of the four districts in the City of Burlington, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Justice of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals Judge, Circuit Court Judge, School Board members and the Burlington Area School District Referendum. Terms for the aldermanic positions will begin April 18, 2017.

Absentee Ballots

Absentee ballots will be available at City Hall beginning March 20. If you are someone that due to age or illness has difficulty getting to the polls, there is the option of being placed on a permanent list in which a ballot will be sent to you for every election. Please call the City Clerk at (262) 342-1161 to request more information on how to be placed on this list.

Skip the Lines for Voter Registration

At www.myvote.wi.gov, an online tool and resource center, electors can register to vote, check your voter registration status, find your polling place, see your sample ballot, view voting history and check provisional ballot status.

If you plan to register online, go to the My Vote website and select what type of voter you are. You will be asked several questions that will allow My Vote to complete the registration form. Once you complete your registration you will be prompted to print your application and be instructed to take the form, along with proof of residence, to the City Clerk at City Hall, 300 N. Pine Street.

Local Medication Disposal Sites for You

Unused or expired prescription medications should never be flushed or poured down the drain. These potentially dangerous pharmaceutical substances can contribute to contamination of our water supply if not disposed of properly. Several Racine County municipalities offer medication collection boxes or drop off sites to dispose of prescription and non-prescription medications.

Allowed:

- Prescription: pills, tablets, creams, ointments, patches, non-aerosol sprays, vials, and liquid medications.
- Non-Prescription: pills, tablets (Keep in the original packaging.)

Not Allowed:

- Needles/sharps, illegal drugs, inhalers, Non-prescription ointments, lotions and liquid medications, personal care products, biohazardous material,

aerosols, mercury thermometers, or household hazardous waste.

Clean Sweep April 29!

Join us for the 2017 Clean Sweep Program where you can dispose of household hazardous waste, appliances, electronics and medication on Saturday, April 29 from 8 a.m. to noon.

With the help of Wisconsin Clean Sweep Grants, the City of Burlington, Town of Burlington, Town of Dover, Village of Rochester, Village of Union Grove, Village of Waterford and Town of Yorkville have collaborated to hold this event at the City of Burlington Public Works Facility. Entrance for the event will be next door at the Burlington Wastewater Treatment Plant, 2100 S. Pine Street (south of the bypass).

You must be a resident of one of the listed communities and show current identification to participate in the program. Please separate chemicals, appliances, electronics, paint, food, clothing and household items before drop off.

Hazardous waste materials are often labeled with indicator words such as "caution", "warning" or "danger". Material that may be toxic, ignitable, corrosive or reactive is also a likely candidate for disposal.

Paints must be in their original containers with a tight lid. All brands (including latex), with the exception of latex stain, will be accepted but the label must be legible. No dried out or nearly dried out paint will be accepted. If that is the case, dry the paint completely and dispose of the paint with the lid removed in your regular trash (latex paint only).

Electronic devices will be accepted this year. There is a **\$25 fee** to ASDA for all tube televisions. Payment is required at the time of disposal. Flat screen monitors and televisions will not have a fee.

Ammunition, explosives, medical waste, propane, containers over five (5) gallons, radioactive materials, alkaline batteries, latex stain, or syringes will not be accepted.



Compost Site Opens April 1

The Compost Site located off of Maryland Avenue will be opening Thursday, April 1, 2017. The site will remain free of charge to City residents. However, you will be asked to show identification that shows you are a City of Burlington resident. There will be an attendant on site at all times.

Materials accepted include grass, leaves, garden waste, wood chips, root balls and brush. The City will not accept brush or logs greater than 8 inches in diameter. No plastic bags, plastic containers, foreign debris of any kind and no tree stumps.

Need wood chips or compost?

Residents are able to take wood chips and compost from the compost site for free. You must load and haul the materials yourself.

Disposal of Household Items

Weekly Bulk Item

John's Disposal provides weekly bulk pick up for single-family to four-family residential units. Items include furniture, bedding, mattresses, carpeting, appliances, tires (2 per week, 8 per year), earth/rocks/concrete/construction and demolition materials (in 36 gallon cans that weigh less than 60 pounds). For questions contact John's Disposal at (888) 473-4701.

Brush Pick-Up Service

Brush pick-up continues on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. Please call in your address to the Department of Public Works at 539-3770 to be placed on the Brush Pick Up List. You must call no later than the Tuesday before the second or fourth Wednesday. The DPW Crew only picks up brush from addresses that have been called in. You may also bring your brush to the Compost Site during operational hours (see hours on page 5).

Light Bulb & Mercury Collection

Mercury thermometers and fluorescent lightbulbs can be taken to the Wastewater Treatment Plant, 2100 S. Pine Street, for free disposal.

Latex Paint

To dispose of latex paint either remove the lid and let the paint dry or fill the can with kitty litter and replace the lid. Paint cans can be put out with your regular trash.

Oil and Antifreeze

City residents who change their oil and antifreeze and need a proper place to dispose of these items, may do so at the Department of Public Works located at 2200 S. Pine Street. Please bring in containers that you do not wish to have back. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 7:00 am and 2:00 pm. Lithium Ion Battery Safety for Consumers

Lithium ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, scooters, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. Take care when using them. In rare cases, they can cause a fire or explosion.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice the problems.

- odor
- change in color
- too much heat
- change in shape
- leaking
- odd noises

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed or on a couch.
- Keep batteries at room temperature.
- Do not place batteries in direct sunlight or keep them in hot vehicles.
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.
- Lithium ion batteries should be placed in a sealed metal container.

If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.



Managing the Canadian Geese at Echo Park Using Border Collies


In an effort to control the Canadian goose population at Echo Park this year, the Park Board has contracted with Migratory Bird Management, LLC to provide avian management in the park. Migratory Bird Management, LLC will use border collies to herd the geese out of the park safely. This system was specifically chosen for several reasons because:

- It is environmentally friendly
- Border collies are perceived by the geese as a natural predator
- Border collies will not harm or catch the geese; the Collie's natural instinct is to herd by giving them the 'eye'
- It is the most effective and productive technique available

The safety of patrons of Echo Park is the utmost concern for the Park Board and City Staff. Conflicts may arise

when great flocks of birds leave large quantities of droppings, which can contain harmful disease. The geese can also be particularly aggressive in spring if they feel that their nest or young are threatened. They've been known to chase after people who unwittingly venture too close to the nest.

This will be a trial program in Echo Park this year beginning the week of March 6, 2017. If the program is successful, the Park Board will evaluate other parks in the city that may need avian management services.
